South Africa aives 'mixed' tour pledge

SOUTH AFRICA has promised to send a "com-pletely multi-racial" Rugby team to Britain and Ireland this season.

Dr. Danie Craven, the masterming behind sheck proposals for an eight-match tour, announced in Cape Town: "The party of twenty-four players will be divided equally between Black; Caloured, and White players."

The four home Bugby Unions will approach premier British and Irish clubs to stage games against the tourists.
