Swansea clinch marathon with a real stunner

Swansea 2, Crystal Palace 1 DAVID GILES returned to Ninian Park, Cardiff, last night to knock Crystal Palace out of the FA Cup with a brilliant second-half goal.

The all-action Giles, 5ft. 7in. of grit and trickery, who began his career with Cardiff, gave an outstanding display in this third-round second replay.

His goal, sensationally ending a five-hour mara-thon, gives Swansea a home tie against Reading in the fourth round.

As the players left the field, Palace's Ian Walsh was shown the red card for abusive language.

Palace survived a lively Swansea star and quickly played their way back into the game.

Defender Jim Cannon went through unmarked on a pass from midfielder Gerry Murphy. He could have picked his spot from 12 yards, but instead lashed a right-foot shot over the bar.

Dave Swindlehurst tested Swansea goal-keeper Glan Letheran with a 20-yard drive before Palace took the lead in the 15th minute with a goal by centre-half Terry Boyle, a former Welsh youth international.

His effort was a real booster for the First Division side, who

pressed strongly for the rest of the first half.

In the second half. Swansea pushed defenders forward and their efforts paid off when striker Robbie James equalised in the 53rd minute.

Skipper Jeremy Charles started the move with a powerful midfield run, before left back Dave Rushbury crossed for James to head in.

BRIAN CLOUGH yesterday offered Charlie George the chance to resurrect his career.

The Nottingham Forest manager agreed a £500,000 fee with Southampton—on condition that the former England striker proves his fitness during a month's loan period.

Snow made George late for an appointment with Clough last night. The deal is expected to go through today.

So Clough and George, two of the game's most talented and controversial characters, finally come together a year after Derby refused to sell the player to their former manager.

George, 29, went to Southampton

instead at £315,000 — and has had a frustrating time. Because of injury, he has played only thirteen games.

Clough said: "Obviously we must establish whether Charlie is fully fit. Nobody wants him to succeed more than I do, because he has tremendous ability.

The move for George confirms there will be no swap deal involving Martin O'Neill and Coventry's Mick Ferguson. Ferguson has lost the chance of a big pay day because he asked for more. He refused to move after the clubs agreed a deal a week ago. Then he changed his mind — and discovered Forest had too.

Now Coventry are set to bid around £400,000 for Willie Miller, Aberdeen's Scottish international midfield man.
