Yet late on the evening of December's 1. Ipswich arrived back home in East Anglia, after losing 4—1 at Coventry. They were third from bottom of the table. The position was bleak.
Chaicman Patrick Cobbold waved goodnight to his manager Boby Robson, his only parting comment being: "Don't worry, see you on Monday."

### Fair comment

The local paper was claiming that Ipswich were in their fifth week of a crisis, which was fair comment. Robson's team could hardly put a foot right. But Cobbold, returning three months later from taking a point off Liverpool at Anfield, told me yesterday:

"A lot of people would have got cold feet, but all we did was to have a bit of a laugh. We didn't panic, or call a board meeting.

"We knew we had the right manager and the right players, and we were prepared to wait in a mood of optimism rather than pessimism."

Indeed Cobbold and his brother John, who was chairman before him, are in the proud position of being able to boast:

"We've never sacked a manager."

Only Liverpool, Manchester United, and Southampton have had as few managers since the war-five—and so it is perhaps a fair reflection that these clubs currently occupy the top positions of the table.

### Team spirit

Ipswich, possibly because they are rather inaccessible and are not prey to so much pressure from the media, are a picture of cosy contentment, but this hides ambition and a team spirit which tends to be one of the best in the country. If the Cobbold family might be open to criticism of old-fashioned patronage by country squires, then such criticism is utterly dismantled by the admirable way in which the family have steered the little club to the top and kept it there with the minimum of fuss and controversy. Cobbold says: "Nobody likes being at the bottom of the table, but some poor devils have to be. We were sure things would come right, and after our performance at Anfield on Saturday, we're sure that Bobby and his team can achieve almost anything."
